#### NEW ORLEANS MUSIC OBSERVED: THE ART OF NOEL ROCKMORE & EMILIE RHYS

We at Scene by Rhys Fine Art are pleased to share the news that the New Orleans Jazz Museum is extending the display of New Orleans Music Observed: The Art of Noel Rockmore and Emilie Rhys to early September 2021. The museum, at 400 Esplanade Avenue, is open Tuesdays-Sundays 9:00am-3:30pm, and we would love it if you would come visit.



Jazz Museum personnel David Kunian (Curator) and Penelope
Jenkins (Exhibition Preparator) have done a standout job with
this exhibition. The layout of the exhibits is beautiful, and the
content is presented in an informative and visually satisfying
way. An added plus is the remarkable number of historic
instruments complementing the art by Rockmore and Rhys,
culled from the Jazz Museum's archival collection.

To commemorate the exhibition and expand upon the theme it presents – the intersection of the visual + musical arts – Emilie is producing a catalog book in coordination with the museum. The starting point for it is the curation of the exhibition, done by David Kunian. Building upon his selections, and working steadily with her little team, comprised of

editor Amy Ferguson,
graphic designer Rebecca
Livaudais, and
photographer Seth
Boonchai, Emilie seeks
both to replicate the
exhibition, providing a
visual record of the art,
artifacts, and indeed the
experience of being in the
rooms for those who
cannot make it here, and
also to amplify it through
the presentation of
important new material.

# Paramount among these is this exclusive biographical story by John Ed Bradley,

#### Picture in a Picture: Noel Rockmore and Emilie Rhys in New Orleans

In this, the lead chapter in the book, the author guides the reader through the complex and riveting intertwined narrative of father and daughter, seen through the lens of their lives in art, providing foundational context for understanding them and providing keys to viewing their art. Just as this exhibition is the first time these two are on display in a museum setting together, so too is *Picture in a Picture* the first time their life stories are presented in tandem.

### Another exciting chapter in the book is: Depiction/Being Depicted

Comprised of interviews with New Orleans musicians by noted radio personality Gwen Thompkins, conducted individually via Zoom last fall, in which they delve into issues arising from their depiction in art and photographs by Emilie and other visual artists. Edited transcripts of the interviews will be presented in the book with a selection of Emilie's live music drawings of them.

We are planning for early-to-mid-spring release of the book, date to-be-determined.
